National parks and the wondrous expanses, stories, and connections they showcase are, unfortunately, in peril.

Everglades National Park officially is at risk, as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in Danger. But across the National Park System, many of the more than 400 units are confronted by development pressures, overcrowding, the crush of infrastructure, structural dilapidation, and an invasion of nonnative species.

National Parks Traveler, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit media organization, brings the majestic, illuminating, and revealing stories of the parks to a global audience.

We take readers underground at Wind Cave National Park, on the water at Everglades National Park, to the roof of Grand Teton National Park, down the Colorado through Grand Canyon National Park, and into the backcountry of Glacier Bay National Park and Preserve.

But, since 2005 we also have been recounting the park system's stories of decay, threats, underfunding, and conflicting management missions. We do this to educate and inform an audience that collectively as a nation owns the parks and should know how they're being managed.

No other media outlet focuses its daily coverage solely on the environmental, scientific, and newsworthy aspects of national parks and protected areas as does the Traveler. It's a role that grows more and more important as more and more news organizations go dark. Since 2004, almost 1,800 news operations have gone out of business.


National Parks Traveler's focus on the parks is watched by other media. The Washington Post, CNN, New York Times, Los Angeles Times, National Geographic, Outside, and other outlets monitor us for story leads.

Among the organizations that value Traveler's journalism and reach, and which financially support our work, are The Pew Charitable Trusts, Cardno, Nova Scotia Tourism, the Society of Environmental Journalists, the Water Desk at the University of Colorado that is funded by the Walton Family Foundation, and Western National Parks Association.

Nearly 3 million readers and listeners from around the world followed the Traveler's coverage in 2020, and the organization's social media footprint has more than 325,000 followers.



OUR IMPACT AND REACH

National Parks Traveler generates more than 1,000 stories a year, with articles and podcasts spanning the National Park System from Alaska to the Caribbean that reach an audience of millions from around the world.

Coverage cannot always be carefully planned out and executed. On any given day there might be exciting research or discoveries coming from a park, a natural disaster that impacts parks and their visitors, or some other news that might affect visitors. In addition to covering those topics, we develop feature-length stories to help readers make the most out of their national park visits, or to examine an issue that merits greater depth and explanation.

As 2021 dawned, the Traveler expanded its regular coverage by moving into Canada, where Jennifer Bain, an award-winning journalist and former travel editor for the Toronto Star, directs coverage. Through June 30, 2021, Canadian readership was up 100 percent.

As the only media organization focused solely on national parks and protected areas, we also watch for behind-the-scenes stories that affect the parks or how visitors might experience them.

NATIONAL PARK TRAVELER'S WEEKLY PODCAST



Voices from across the National Park System appeared on National Parks Traveler's weekly podcast series.

Among the guests were Dr. Dave Conlin, chief of the National Park Service's Submerged Resources Center; Yellowstone National Park Superintendent Cam Sholly; Dr. Ilsa Kuffner, the lead USGS investigator working on elkhorn coral transplants; National Park Foundation President and CEO Will Shafroth and Friends of Acadia President and CEO David MacDonald; Cape Lookout National Seashore Superintendent Jeff West; Richard Emmett, director of the Blue Ridge Music Center; and Dr. Jacob Job, research associate and listening lab director at the Sound and Light Ecology Program at Colorado State University.

Traveler Editor Kurt Repanshek and Contributing Editor Lynn Riddick combined to generate 52 episodes during the past year. The shows were produced by sound recording engineer Jess Repanshek. More than 200,000 downloads of Traveler podcasts were recorded through June 30, 2021.

The 40- to 50-minute programs are distributed through libsyn.com, which sends them to iTunes, Facebook, Twitter, radio.com, Spotify, YouTube, and other podcast outlets. Listeners came from more than 70 countries to catch at least one episode.

LOOKING AHEAD

With the coronavirus pandemic seemingly waning, National Parks Traveler looks to have more on-the-ground coverage from the National Park System in the coming year. National Parks Traveler garners attention from other media outlets from time to time due to its unique role as the only news organization focused on covering national parks and protected areas.



Repanshek talks about five hidden gems in a conversation with the anchors at Chicago's WGN-TV from May 2021.




Also, John DiPietro interviewed Repanshek for <u>The Camper Report</u> that aired early in April about RVing in our national parks.
